The Dade School System is a county unit, the fourth largest system in the nation, and the second largest business operation in Florida, following only the State government.

Nanagement of the schools is totally independent of metropolitan and city governments. The metropolitan government collects the school tax for the school system but exercises no control over its use.

The seven-member School-Board is elected by countywide vote to serve overlapping four-year terms. Regular, open meetings are held in the Board auditorium twice a month on Wednesday at one o'clock.

Responsibility for administration of the schools is vested in the district superintendent, appointed by the Board. The school district is divided into four geographical areas, each with an area superintendent and administrative staff.
